Weekday Mass

Clocks Go Back

2am on Sunday 29th October becomes 1am as British Summer Time comes to an end. Archdeacon's Visitation

The office of Archdeacon is a very ancient one: there are references to one in a document dated around 370AD but this is unlikely to have been the very start of the role, it is referring to a post which already exists.

It has been said that the Archdeacon is "the eve of the bishop." A diocese is the territory for which a bishop has the care and each diocese is divided into smaller units, called ู a n archdeaconry. Archdeacons are more 'hands-on' than the bishop in the area entrusted to them. Our Archdeacon, the Venerable Andy Wooding-Jones, will visit us on Thursday 19th October with mission as his special focus, meeting with the PCC at 7.45pm.

All Saints Wednesday 1st November

All Saints is our celebration of all those who earthly lives have concluded with elevation into the very presence of God. Our Mass for the Solemnity (the highest rank of feast in the Church) is at 11.30am.

All Souls Thursday 2nd November

The day for remembering all the dead awaiting the call to eternal life. Our Said Mass at 10am, includes the names of all who are on our anniversaries of death list.

The Sung Mass, at 7.30pm, includes the names of all those for whom we have done funerals over the past year.

Christmas Eve this year is a Sunday, that means we are in Advent for the morning 10am Sung Mass and then have to do a quick change to get everything ready for Christmas services, which will begin with the Crib Service at 4pm. It will be all go!

The Church's Electoral Roll

If we go back several centuries then the primary civic sense of togetherness was exercised by the Church. Those who held office within the parish church were often expected by the monarch and their ministers to be accountable for various repairs, provisions and taxes in their local area. These parish representatives were therefore responsible for things way beyond the church and so everyone—whether or nor they were members of the Sunday congregation—was able to exercise a vote for some of the church's officers.

Eventually the provision of local services became the responsibility of a civic organization called, rather confusingly, the parish council. The reason for keeping the 'parish' name was that it felt reassuringly familiar rather than sounding all new-fangled and threatening. The body responsible for church matters was named the Parochial Church Council to distinguish it from the civil Parish Council.

Today there are still some elements of the history of church and community which overlap. Our churchwardens are voted into office at the Annual Meeting of Parishioners. This is entirely separate from the Annual Parochial Church Meeting and although the two meetings are different, they are often held on the same day, one following the other.

At the Annual Meeting of Parishioners anyone who lives in the parish or who is on the parish's electoral roll is entitled to attend and vote. That's why we don't have Apologies for Absence at this meeting: because in our parish of Swanley thousands of people aren't here! At the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, which transacts business relating to the Parochial Church Council, only those who are members of the Church's Electoral Roll are entitled to attend and vote.

The Church's Electoral Roll is open to anyone who lives in the parish. But it is open, too, to those who don't live in the parish but who have attended public worship here regularly for six months or more. Once people are on the roll, there is no difference between those who are resident and those who are not, all can attend and vote at both annual meetings. If you live outside the parish but would like to express your support for what goes on here, you can join the roll: our Electoral Roll Officer is Kevin Merrick and if you ask him for a form, he'll arrange for one to be given to you, you fill it in and all is set! When Jesus Christ said to those who surrounded Him "<u>Go</u>, make disciples of the all the nations," what He didn't say was "<u>stay here</u> and invite people to come along if they feel like it."!

By saying "Go" He intended them to understand that people will not receive the message of hope, the reality of God's love nor the loving community which flow from these important gifts unless they are taken to those who are without them.

Each and every Christian has the responsibility to take the love of God out to others. Not to plant themselves in a place and invite others in, but to GO and spread abroad God's love and plan for salvation.

It is not only "professional" Christians like bishops, priests and deacons who have this calling, it is every Baptized member of the Body of Christ.

We live in a world which is crying out for love and spirituality. These needs have been twisted by the Evil One such that many people today are lured into thinking that their needs and wants should somehow be central to what the



world provides and that a spirituality solely centred on them will be equal to anything the world can throw at them.

Christians have a different perspective, we believe God is the centre, not us. That we are stronger when working with others and that spirituality is not a focus on ourselves but an understanding that we are members of something much bigger. In other words, it is in relationship that spirituality finds its true flowering. Bv finding ourselves connected with God, other people and the whole of the creation which surrounds us, we are moved to understand that we have a place, a valued place, in a large and complex society.

The prevailing focus on "self, self, self" is harmful because it eats away at a proper humility and a proper sense of a world



which is not ordered according to our needs and preferences but must take into account other people.

When newly-built housing estates have no sense of—and no facilities for—community then they very quickly descend into selfishness and vanity.

Christians are to create a sense of community wherever they find themselves. They are to seek out and maintain good and healthy relationships through mutual service and support and by involving others not selectively (based entirely on personal and particular preferences) but with a broad brush which sweeps all into a community where people know each other and support each other.

We do this by communicating with everyone, not just people

we know and like! And by doing things which involve loads of people and not merely a few. We go out and invite in Church enables us to pool our community-building with other Christians who are based within different circles of community and so by having social events enable people to come we together and see each other as neighbours and thus enable friendships to be formed and nurtured.

Church can unite a community at times when prayer is needed, or when reassurance is longedfor. We can open doors to provide a holy space, set apart from the daily struggle, and so be a place of calm, of quiet and of true peace.

Christians who go out and invite in, who go out and do shopping, check on the vulnerable and take people places are all doing the important work of building community.

In a world fascinated by celebrity and falling into the trap of self-obsession, there is a need for people to stand up for values of care and concern. Christians are inspired to do this by a Saviour who didn't tell them to stay in one place but to "Go."

Community Warden Consultation

The Community Warden service has been informed that it must save \pounds 1million from its budget. The present staffing level is 60 wardens (although there are supposed to be 70) and it is proposed to reduce that to 38 wardens: 24 would be equally allocated across the county's districts but a further 14 would be deployed on the basis of an analysis of deprivation and social need.

Foodbank Looks Set to Close

They are looking for new accommodation but if they are not able to find something suitable then they will have to cease operating. Swanley Now Twinned with Fastiv, Ukraine

Our Town Council became the first to twin with a town in Ukraine since Russia started the war by invading their neighbour. Fastiv is to the south west of Kyiv and is home to around 44,000 people. Swanley's Mayor signed the twinning declaration with the Mayor of Fastiv, with civic dignitaries, joining the ceremony by video-link from a secure underground facility in Fastiv. The objects of the twinning declaration are to show solidarity with a community at war and to create and foster a true sharing of culture, community, ideas and to collaborate across a whole range of projects. Above all, it is to build a bridge between two very different communities at a time of terrible and intense pressure.

Protecting Children & Vulnerable Adults

Everyone should always have been safe in church and with church people. Sadly, experience has demonstrated that has not always been the case. A great many people have suffered abuse at the hands of those who should have been caring for them and the response of the institution—locally and beyond—has frequently been poor and more about defence of the church's reputation than care for the victim or survivor.

This is why training is safeguarding is so important: it helps everyone understand how to respond if an individual manages to share what they have suffered and it means that we all understand how the system should work so we can hold to account those who are charged with this important work.

If you would like to undertake the training just search "Church of England safeguarding" and follow the Church of England's links through to its safeguarding portal.
